Developed Relevant	<p>Across a range of reading</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A range of relevant points clearly identified across the text. Summary of information from different sources or different places in the same text. Relevant comments incorporate relevant textual reference and quotation to support main ideas or argument. Comments consider wider implications or significance of information, events or ideas in the text. Developed understanding of implicit ideas and perspectives through specific links between context/texts/task. 	<p>Across a range of reading</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Some detailed explanation of how structural choices support the writer's theme or purpose and contribute to the overall effect. Detailed explanation, with appropriate terminology, of how language is used and its effects. Some drawing together of comments on how language choices contribute to the overall impact. Evidence for identifying main purpose precisely located at word/ sentence level or traced through a text. Some exploration of viewpoint developed through close reference to the text. Comments indicate a clear understanding of points of comparison between texts, or versions of the same text, supported by textual reference. Some exploration of textual conventions or features as used by writers from different periods. How sentence structures influence the reader's response. <p>Comparison</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Differences between texts including some written in different periods. <p>Evaluation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> How to present an evaluation of authorial viewpoint, structure and/or language using relevant, well-chosen textual evidence. <p>QWC</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> How to present ideas and opinions by: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Summarising information from a range of sources. Synthesising information from a range of material. Acknowledging sources. Using close reference to details. Using an appropriate format to record information/ annotation /note making. How to comment on the writer's point of view. How to comment effectively on the impact of the writer's language choices.

Comments identify similarities and differences between texts, or versions of the same text, with repeated explanation. Repeated explanation of how the contexts in which texts are written and read contribute to meaning. Recognising devices and comment on their effects.
